




Sammy D Foundation

Our Year 10 students were visited by the Sammy D Foundation, a foundation made in the honour of 17 year old Sam Davis. Sam was a victim to a one punch attack on the 4th of May, 2008, where his life was tragically cut short. Sam's story has been shared by his parents for 13 years, educating over 140,000 young people about the consequences of violent behavior.

Neil shared his story about losing his son in a one punch incident at a party, before students participated in a drug and alcohol workshop. They learnt about staying safe around drugs and alcohol and were challenged whilst wearing 'beer goggles'.






FOOD AND HOSPITALITY

In week 6, Stage 1 Food and Hospitality students hosted a 2 course lunch for some of their subject teachers through the production of a "pop up" style restaurant. Students worked collaboratively to design and plan their restaurant, develop their menu and run the restaurant on the day.

The overall outcome was a success, with outstanding feedback received. Well done Year 11's!











CLM Students have had a very busy second semester and have done a great job working together to revegetate Forestry SA Biodiversity Corridor- Whennan Corridor. This Corridor links Whennan Native Forest Reserve to Mt McIntyre NFR as an Ecological Corridor amongst the Pine Plantations. It links native vegetation for Fauna to travel from one Native Forest to another. All plants were grown at our school nursery and to protect the plants from kangaroos they were all guarded.

We were fortunate to have funding from the Limestone Coast Grass roots Grant which enabled our students to experience going out on Country with an Elder and engage with Aboriginal Culture, Connection to Country and Caring for Country, recording Flora and Fauna and learning about the Seasonal Calendar of all sites prior to revegetating. Through these projects students completed units in 'Natural Area Restoration Works' and 'Plant Trees and Shrubs.'

Students also volunteered at the Valley Lakes Conservation Area and surrounds completing 'Treat Weeds' by controlling environmental weeds using the cut and swab technique, and also prepared the ground for planting by mulching a site next to a waterhole. We also engaged in a fauna survey using Elliot traps and observations at the Conservation Area. Thank you to Raz for organising this project.

Recently the Forestry Ranger introduced us to Mt Lyon Corridor and we conducted a Fauna survey and set up a camera trap. We were able to see who was visiting the corridor through saved images from the camera. It was interesting to see what fauna was using the corridor after dark and record our findings. Observation surveys of sightings, scats, tracks and other signs were conducted at Mt Lyon and Lake Edward. Students really enjoyed the 'Recognise Fauna' unit and we were also able to collect seed for the Mt Lyon Project and Nursery for 2022.

These projects provided a wide range of learning and practical experiences which has given each student new skills, confidence and appreciation for the local environment while completing units of competency in Cert 2 Conservation and Land Management.




